

Rodney Bonnell, May11943@aol.com or 949 Fulton Rd. N.W. Apt#1, Canton, OH 44703, contacted us at the behest of Clem Bonnell, acbonnell@embarqmail.com or 7 Deer Path, Milford, NJ 08848-1928. Clem told him that they were related and that piqued Rodney's interest. According to my computer they are 5th cousins, once removed. Rodney was two years old when his father died and he lost contact with his Bonnell kinfolk. Claude had info on Rodney and his parents, but Rodney has provided some additional data.

My father was Ralph Hope Bonnell, died in 1946 and is buried at Farmington Cemetery, Farmington, OH. I was born in Crabapple, OH and we lived in Duncanwood when my father died. Both towns were mining towns and are no longer there.

My mother was Frances Mercy Miller, born April 6, 1910. She later married Ingle Dayton. She died June 10, 1980 and was buried at Warnock Cemetery, Warnock, OH.


My only sibling was Sarah Lucille [Bonnell], born Feb. 1, 1933. She married [Phillip] Elbert. She died Nov. 3, 2007 and was buried at Brookfield Cemetery, Massillon, OH.

Also I don't know if you wanted my children's names but just in case they are Michelle Louise, Christina Kay, and Teresa Roseanne; their mothers name was Janet (King) Bunnell. We were married 7 years before divorce. Also I have a child named Andrea Hoffman, mother Janet Hoffman.

Paul Garrity, desangbleu@yahoo.com, from San Bernadino, CA wrote to get some information about Jeannette Bonnell (CB264541). He was doing some research for the local library on the wife of Leland Norton, for whom Norton AFB, CA was named. Between Claude's website and Ancestry.com I was able to piece together a lot of info for him. In return, the library sent me multiple newspaper clippings about Leland and Jeannette. The photos are from one of those clippings.



Leland F. Norton

Leland was born 12 March 1921 in San Bernardino. In August 1941 he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force, which was fairly common. After the Pearl Harbor attack he transferred to the US Army Air Corps effective in 1942. He served in Labrador, Presque Isle (ME), Greenland, DeRider (LA), and finally in January 1944 he was assigned to the 640th Bomb Squadron in England. Sometime in between all of those assignments, he married Jeannette Bonnell. While attacking a marshaling yard on his 16th combat mission, Captain Norton's A-20 Havoc was struck by anti-aircraft fire on 27 May 1944 near Amiens, France. After ordering his crew to bail out, Captain Norton perished with his Havoc. In 1950, San Bernardino Air Force Base was renamed Norton Air Force Base in his honor. Norton AFB was closed as a result of BRAC 1988 in 1994. .

Jeannette was actually born Jeannette Brundage, 1 Feb 1924 in E. Orange, NJ, daughter of Frank and Jeannette (Bonnell) Brundage. In the Bunnell/Bonnell newsletter, Vol. IV, October 1990, page 50 -51 an article states that information provided by Jeannette (Bonnell) Lance said that "When their daughter Nettie died 3 days after the birth of her daughter, Horace and Anna adopted their granddaughter Jeannette. Her name was changed from Brundage to Bonnell, and she was raised like a sister to her aunt Agnes." The 1930 census shows Jeannette Bonnell to be the adopted daughter of Horace Bonnell. At this point her life becomes very interesting and Paul Garrity provided most of this information

In 1943 she married Leland Francis Norton. He was killed 11 months later in France.

In 1945 she married John Gill, who was a chief pilot of Eastern Airlines. It appears, based on her 3rd husband's obituary, that she and Gill had at least two children; James H. Gill and Roberta Gill. James was a Navy Lieutenant at one time and his wife was Christina ____, of Santa Fe, New Mexico. Roberta Gill married Samuel Oliver and they were residing in Union Township, NJ by 2007. John died in 1966. In 1970, Jeannette married Wesley L. Lance who was born on November 21, 1908, in Glen Gardner, Hunterdon County, New Jersey. Wesley was an active politician who was elected as a Republican to the New Jersey General Assembly from Hunterdon County in 1937, 1938, 1939 and 1940. He served in the NJ State Senate, resigning in 1943 to enter the U. S. Navy. Later he served again in the NJ State Senate and was a member of the NJ Bar and practiced law in Clinton, NJ for


70 years Jeannette died 30 Mar 2002. Wesley died 25 Aug 2007 and was buried in the Spruce Run Cemetery, Glen Gardner, Hunterdon Co., NJ. Jeannette's lineage is William¹, Nathaniel², Isaac³, Abraham⁴, John⁵, John⁶, John⁷, Mahlon⁹, Horace¹⁰, Jeannette¹¹, Jeannette¹².

Columbian, Bay City, MI 48706, previously sent information on brothers Willard and Lafayette Bunnell, which I printed in the February issue. She has since received more information from the Winona County Historical Society in Michigan, where the Willard Bunnell House is. From the archivists, Marianne Mastenbrook and Walt Bennick, Ann received information on the Bunnell graves that were originally near the Bunnell House there.

“From what we have found out, the graves were moved from the Bunnell House property and put on the land that belonged to the Smith Family in Homer. However, these graves are only marked with "rocks" and the area is not taken care of as a Cemetery. It is very, very hard to get to and a resident of Homer provided a map for us, and if someone goes, she must lead the way. [Marianne Mastenbrook]”

“Ann Marie - Please find photos and the Bunnell Grave Site attached. The grave site is along the top of a narrow ridge that extends up from the Bunnell House. It is leaf covered and the tomb stones are but pieces of limestone that have been placed at the head and foot of each grave. They are not marked, or at least no markings can be seen. It has been reported that there are nine graves at the site, but I counted only a couple of "markers." The markers are difficult to see. On the b/w photos I tried contrast to enhance the stones, they are near the center of each photograph. - Walt Bennick, Archivist”

In the February issue, page 11, I introduced Belinda Pruett, [belindap@ncmodulars.com](mailto:belindap@ncmodulars.com) or 179 Bailey Thomas Road, Sanford NC 27332 [new address], who is researching her Bunnell ancestors in North Carolina. She provided some additional information.

“What I do know is that Mary Lee Bunnell’s father was William P Bunnell.(Some census records shows a T instead of a P but it is a P). Her mother was Beulah Scoggin(s). Mary Lee was born August 17, 1907 and died April 20, 1993.

Her siblings: Robert “Bob” Bunnell born 04/23/1910 died 02/10/1980, Barney Leighton Bunnell born 06/13/1905 died 05/01/1963 he married Eliza Carter, Annie “Top” Bunnell born around 1913 she had children Nancy Ann and Jim John (this is all I know about her for now), Jane Bunnell, and Susan Bunnell who married a man with the last name Britt, Haywood Bunnell born 05/18/1922 died 01/24/1990 he married Doris (don't know maiden name). William P & Beulah also had a baby girl born and died 17 Sept 1919.

Mary Lee Bunnell married James Roden Fore.

These Bunnells were from the Harnett, Moore, and Lee County areas of NC.

I do know that my father and I went to visit a church and I forget the name of the church but I saw Durham P Bunnell's grave. I can't be sure but I am pretty sure I saw William P Bunnell's grave there too-anyway I do know that my dad told me this is where some of our family on the Bunnell side was buried. Therefore, I am thinking William P has to be tied in to Durham P some how-some way.

I plan to visit that church again as soon I find out the name of it and if the rain will finally go away here!"

Since that e-mail she has visited the church and graveyard (Piney Grove Church, Cameron, NC). The gravestone for William P. Bunnell is there and shows a death date of 1961. Likewise, Durham's gravestone is there and shows a death date of 10 July 190X.




Marcus Seneca BONNELL, a prosperous farmer, occupying a beautiful residence on the dividing line between Harrison and Crosby townships, five miles northeast from Harrison and two miles northwest from New Haven, is a grandson of Aaron BONNELL who came to the Miami country in 1805, with his brothers Benjamin and Paul, and his married sisters, Rhoda and Abigail - a strong delegation for one family at



one time. They were all children of Benjamin and Rachel BONNELL, who came from England and settled in New Jersey, where their family was reared. The father was drowned in the East river, near New York, with ten others. November 10, 1798, on a boat crossing from the city to Brooklyn, upon which a number of casks of rum rolled to one side and overturned the frail vessel, with the terrible results above noted. He was then seventy-five years old. His wife survived him until 1812, when she departed this life, in the eighty-fifth year of her age. Aaron, the seventh child and fifth son, was born March 4, 1759, it is believed in Essex county, New Jersey. He was a brother-in-law to Judge Othniel LOOKER, the distinguished pioneer who settled near Harrison in 1801; they having married twin sisters - Judge LOOKER, Pamela, and Mr. BONNELL, Rachel CLARK. They had six children - two daughters and four sons, of whom the father of the subject of our sketch was one - Clark BONNELL, born November 18, 1790, in New Jersey. His father, Aaron, was the only one of the BONNELL colony who settled in Harrison (formerly Crosby) township, the others stopping in the neighborhood of Carthage and taking farms there. Aaron entered the northwest quarter of section eighteen, due north of the subsequent site of Harrison village, in the valley of the Whitewater, improved the place, and remained there until his death. During his lifetime he drew a pension as an artificer for the Government during the war of the Revolution. His wife also died upon the old place near Harrison. Some time before the death of his parents, Clark BONNELL, who had learned, in part, the trade of a shoemaker in New York State, before the removal of the family to the west, was married to Miss Elsey WYKOFF of a family residing near Harrison, on the Indiana side and removed to the village, where he pursued his trade for many years and then removed to a country neighborhood in Ross township, Butler county, five miles from Hamilton, where he continued to follow his business. Remaining here about five years, he removed to New London, Butler county, where he lost his wife by death. She was born February 7, 1794, and died in September, 1835. Her husband died in Cincinnati in 1864, in the seventy-fourth year of his age. Their children numbered nine, of whom Marcus Seneca was the third, and the oldest son. He was

born upon the old place near Harrison. in a cabin where his father was then residing, November 8, 1816. He had some schooling in the poor "subscription schools" of that day, which he attended for brief periods as the pressing labors of the farm and workshop would allow and in due time learned his father's trade, beginning to help in a small way when he was but nine years of age. He did not take kindly to the business, as it was too confining, and he was strongly predisposed to farm life; so he did little at shoemaking after he was fifteen years of age. For about eight years he served as a farm hand at various places in Hamilton and Butler counties, by the month or year, and for the next two years worked Judge ANDERSON's farm in Butler county, ' "on shares." Then for two years he similarly farmed the old place near Harrison, which had become the possession of his grandmother. He also managed it a similar term for the purchasers of the farm after her death - Messrs. George ARNOLD and Peter RIFFNER. The latter was father of Martha R., who became the wife of Mr. BONNELL December 8, 1842. He was now residing on a rented farm on the other side of the Whitewater, in the edge of Indiana, where he remained a year and removed to the FROST farm, on LEE's creek, in the north part of the township. This he occupied, on five-year leases, for the period of fifteen years, and so successfully that he was enabled to purchase the one-hundred-and-forty acre tract upon which he now lives, in 1856, two years before his last lease expired. To this he removed at the expiration of his lease, and here he has since resided, adding one hundred and fourteen acres to his original purchase, and making a farm of such high excellence and reputation that the award of the premium offered in 1880. by the Hamilton County Agricultural society, for "the best farm of forty or more acres, in the general plan of buildings, fields, fences, and the skill shown in drainage and general cultivation of the several kinds of crops, in care of stock, implements, and tools, etc.," was made to Mr. BONNELL, after careful inspection of his place by a committee of the society. He has, among other improvements, as many as twenty-two and one-fourth miles of under-draining. In 1860 he built the fine residence in which he now lives and which appears to advantage in our illustration of his premises. He has devoted himself to his business, taking little interest in politics and holding no public offices. He has been for many years a member of the lodge of Odd Fellows of Harrison.

Clark Marion, born March 18, 1845; married Sarah BUTTS September 11, 1872; died January 21, 1880.

Peter RIFFNER, born April 20, 1847, died May 22, 1874.

William Riffner, born March 30, 1849, married Miss Jennie COOK December 5, 1870; lives in Henry county, Indiana, a carpenter.


Stephen Easton. born June 21, 1851; died May 6, 1875.

Patricia (Howell) McKinley, patm1938@sktc.net or 925 Road 2, Cedar Vale, KS 67024-9052, sent a biography of her grandfather William "Billy" Bonnell. Pat goes on to say that like Billy, her parents, her husband, her and their three children have all been in the rodeos. Billy is being recommended to the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. I have taken the liberty of editing the bio and hopefully have retained the meat of it.

W.S. (Billy) Bonnell was born in Mayetta, KS July 19, 1877 and began roping and breaking horses at an early age along with his two younger brothers. At the age of 12, after the death of his father, he rode a horse from Gravette, Arkansas to Ponca City, Oklahoma to work for the ranches of Moncravy and Fuller as a way of helping the family income. While cowboying on the ranch he soon perfected a method of tying a calf that was faster than others at the time. Billy and his two brothers worked with the Pawnee Bill Wild West Show and participated in the filming of a motion picture which sadly no longer exists. In fact, Billy and his wife Mary wired money to Europe for the brothers to come back to the U. S. when the European tour went bust. Billy also worked with the 101 Ranch Wild West Show and was well acquainted and traveled with many of the people there including Bill Pickett and Lucille Mulhall. In fact, he named his youngest daughter Lillian Lucille after his good friend Lucille Mulhall.

Billy's horse Romeo, which he used for many years was considered one of the world's best roping horses. Many record holders and great people rode and appreciated Romeo's skills and personality, including Tom Mix, Buffalo Vernon, Ellison Carroll, Fred Beason, and Lucille Mulhall.

Billy helped organize and produce "Ropings and Ridings" or Roundups" as many Rodeos were called then, in the south central Kansas and north central Oklahoma areas and was a co-founder of his local polo club, in Cedar Vale, KS. His first newspaper documented win that we have found in steer roping was in October 1907 in Stroud Oklahoma, at 24 seconds. He broke the current world record in calf roping in Cedar Vale, Kansas in August 1909 at 25 seconds. The original rules required much more of a roper as the calf got a much longer head start.

Billy competed at the Stampede in Calgary Canada in 1912 and is listed in the book "Man, Beast, Dust" as one of the important contestants of that year who did command performances for the visiting royal family from England. Billy booked a box car under his name to leave from Arkansas City, Kansas for the

horses of the group from this area competing and traveling to the Stampede in Winnipeg, Canada in 1913. Among the group were Henry Grammer, Joe Gardner, George, Bert and Charles Weir, and Lucille Mulhall, only to find out that when returning at the custom house at the border one member had sold his horse. Whereupon Billy was detained to get the papers proving the sale and accounting or the difference in the livestock count. That year of the Stampede Bill Bonnell, Joe Gardner, W. Hale, Charles Johnson, and Bert Weir were declared the world's champion steer roping team.

No Rodeo or roping was too big or too small for him. In the 1920's, in his mid forties, Billy Bonnell continued to rope in more local competitions rather than traveling far away. This allowed him to attend to his family, land, and livestock obligations at home. He broke and trained horses for roping, racing, work teams and polo through the years. He taught and encouraged many young cowboys and his own daughter and granddaughter to compete and entertain in rodeos. He saw his friends at the ropings and kept pace with the winnings, even beating his friend Ben Johnson at Winfield, Kansas July of 1920. Billy continued to train horses and compete into his older age. At the age of 64 years old Billy won 2nd place at Moline, Kansas competing against ropers less than half his age. He died on June 4, 1951 at 74 years old with many paying their respects. Ben Johnson, Jr remembered him fondly to members of our family and stated that he deserved to be in the Cowboy Hall of Fame. He has become a part of local history and folklore, and is fondly remembered by his family.

[Ed. Note: The Ben Johnson, Jr mentioned above was a rodeo cowboy, Hollywood stunt man, actor, and rancher who was in several movies with John Wayne. William Sanford "Billy" Bonnell is 002590 in Claude's database. His lineage can be seen in the Direct Lines entry by his granddaughter, Pat (Howell) McKinley.]

Books

While doing one of those "fishing expeditions" in Google Book Search I ran across one listing titled *The Shapley Connection* which is or was a family history and genealogy newsletter. The listing provided only a snippet of the October 1989 issue, but it was discussing a William Bonnell born in England about 1610, son of Benjamin. So I again turned to John Grady to see if he could find the full page or pages of material. As always, John came through and mailed me a copy of the article. Unfortunately the portion of the article dealing with the Bunnell Ancestry in England was directly from Ruth Duncan's book, *William Bunnell and his Descendants* and from William Austin's' discussion of the Huguenot connection and Benjamin being the father of William. This author's final statement was "All of which is to say that William Bunnell's ancestry remains in doubt." So we found no new material but we have checked off one more reference that we had been looking for.

Post Script

The attached pages are a listing of all the research "books" I currently have. Books is in quotes as many of them are CDs and others are just extracts of the pages containing Bu/Bo material. But, if you are looking for info that might be in one of these books, let me know and I'll be glad to do a search for you. If you have high speed internet I can post it on our web page and you can download it. If you don't use internet I can mail you the pages that are of interest to you.

This is the first issue that isn't 20 pages long, but hopefully it still contains sufficient material to hold your interest. There certainly is a variety.
